of 1988 as amended in 1994

TECHNOLOGY-RELATED ASSISTANCE FOR INDIVIDUALS WITH DISABILITIES ACT OF 1988 AS AMENDED IN 1994, US Public Laws 100-407 and 103-218.

There are 56 of these projects in the United States and US territories

#### On-line Tools – our new reality

Telehealth and Online Meeting - Growth

Telehealth visits up 154% in last week of March 2020 compared to the same time in 2019 - CDC

ESC went from 4 telehealth visits to over 600 in just a few weeks

20% of medical visits in the country are expected to be virtual this year - Doximity

#### Telehealth and Online Meeting - Problem

1 in 4 disabled adults say they have high-speed internet and an internet enabled device at home

Disabled adults are 3 times as likely as those without a disability to say they never go online

Only 39% of disabled adults have a high level of confidence in their ability to use the internet and other communication tools.

# Let's talk Disability, AT and Online Tools

About Accessibility – Disability (1)

Visual

Blindness, low vision, colorblindness

#### Motor

Limited ability to use a mouse or keyboard, slow response time, limited fine motor control

#### Cognitive

Learning disabilities, reading level, impaired memory

#### Audio

Deafness or Hard of Hearing

About Accessibility – Disability (2)

Temporary disabilities:

Hand in cast

Pupils dilated at optometrist

Ear infection

(or went to loud concert the night before!)

Laryngitis

**Fatigue** 

Situational disabilities:

Broken mouse, speakers

Loud train

Distracted by pets, telemarketer

About Accessibility – AT (1)

Assistive Technology - Visual

Eyeglasses

Operating system:

High-contrast mode

Reduce transparency

Text size

Screen magnifier

Screen reader

Braille display

About Accessibility – AT (2)

Assistive Technology - Audio

Hearing aid

Transcriptions

Captions

CART (live transcription)

About Accessibility – AT (3)

Assistive Technology - Motor

Alternative keyboard (high-contrast, large keys)

Onscreen keyboard

Alternative mouse

Switches (button, sip-puff, eye-blink)

Mouth stick

Head wand

New! Voice Control on iOS

About Accessibility – AT (4)

Assistive Technology - Cognitive

Speech recognition

Ex: Dragon NaturallySpeaking

Reader view modes & screen magnifiers

(to reduce distraction)

Word prediction

About Accessibility – AT (5)

Assistive Technology - Voice Recognition

Echo, Siri, Google Home, Dragon, iOS Voice Control, etc.

People with visual disabilities (typing on touch device)

People with physical disabilities

People with cognitive disabilities

Probably you!

#### Online Meeting Tools?

What is an online meeting tool?

Web software or device-based tool that connects people who are not in the same location

#### Basic Requirements

Reliable high-speed internet

Device with video and audio capabilities

Webcam

#### Lots of Choices...

Simple or Complex

Free or Expensive

#### How do I choose?

5 questions to ask...

What do you need to do in your meetings?

Face-to-face conversations

How many participants

Do you meeting have breakouts

Do you provide support to other users?

How easy is the tool to use?

If you are struggling to figure it out – you bet others are too

#### **How do I choose? (continued)**

Does it integrate into my existing technology?

What other tools do you use?

How much does it cost?

pricing is all over the place

more features = more expensive

#### Is it accessible?

Does it work with assistive technologies?

VPAT – Voluntary Product Accessibility Template

Accessibility Helpdesk

#### **General Accessibility (1)**

Include a statement on your website, registration, and all other communications that asks attendees to specify their accessibility/accommodations needs, gives a deadline for requests, and provides the name, email address, and phone number of the individual to contact.

List in all event communications the accessibility/accommodations that you will provide without the need for attendees having to request, such as captioning.

#### **General Accessibility (2)**

Provide materials that help orient participants to your chosen platform. Offer practice sessions in advance of the main event.

Offer different ways that individuals can access the event, including via Internet and telephone.

#### **General Accessibility (3)**

Ensure that the environment behind presenters is not distracting. If it is, use a virtual background, but note that some can wash out faces

Avoid flashing or strobing animations in presentation or other materials

# **General Accessibility (4)**

Improper positioning of someone's device will dimmish their ability to participate in on-line meetings. Mounting options should be considered to allow for proper positioning.

Simple keyboard short-cuts allow persons who don't use a mouse (ex. vision, mobility, etc.) to navigate the system more easily.

# Accessibility for the Deaf and HoH (1)

Make sure audio is clear. Poor audio quality can make it hard for people to access the event. Consider a guiet room.

Have speakers use a headset to improve audio. Speak clearly and slowly.

#### Accessibility for the Deaf and HoH (2)

Mute all attendees but those speaking to keep background noise to a minimum. Take Turns - Ask people to raise their hand and speak their name every time they speak, so captioners and attendees alike all know who is talking.

#### Accessibility for the Deaf and HoH (3)

Captions or Subtitles

Process of displaying text to provide additional or interpretive information Live vs. Artificial Intelligence

Sign Language Interpreting

Spotlight or Pin the interpreter so they can be always seen.

#### Accessibility for the Deaf and HoH (4)

Proper lighting

Clearly see the people in the room.

Eliminate unwanted shadows that skew facial expressions or appearance Face the light source

Avoid overhead lighting Use the right amount of light

# **Accessibility for Blind and Low Vision (1)**

Describe live scenarios and images.

Read any text that appears on screen.

#### Accessibility for Blind and Low Vision (2)

Make sure the speaker's face is well-lit and can be clearly seen.

If there is a method that will be used to vote or flag who can speak next, make sure all participants can access the process.

#### Accessibility for Blind and Low Vision (3)

Show persons how to adjust the interface so anyone using a screen reader or screen magnifier can adjust the video windows as needed.

Turn on high contrast settings and adjust the font settings if available to make text more visible.

#### Accessibility for Cognitive Needs (1)

Be patient when explaining how to use online platforms. Repeat information if necessary.

Use plain language during the event. Avoid using jargon.

# **Accessibility for Cognitive Needs (2)**

Build processing time/breaks into your event.

Leave ample time for questions.

#### **Accessibility in Common Virtual Platforms (1)**

Supports screen readers:

Zoom, Google Meet, Teams, BlueJeans

Supports ASL interpreters:

Zoom, Google Meet, Teams

Sign language interpreter app:

Google Hangouts

Automatic closed captioning:

Zoom, Teams, Google, BlueJeans, etc.

#### **Accessibility in Common Virtual Platforms (2)**

Manual captioning (must retain a captioner):

Zoom, Google Meet, Teams, GoToMeeting

Keyboard shortcuts:

Zoom, Google Meet, Teams, GoToMeeting, Google Hangouts, BlueJeans Support for high contrast mode:

GoToMeeting, Zoom, Teams

Has screen magnifiers and visual modifications:

Google Hangouts

# **Accessibility Links for Common Virtual Platforms (3)**

# **End-user - Preparation for online meetings (1)**

Prep your technology

Know what kind of technology is being used

Request accommodations

Consider a test run

Prep your environment

Remove distractions and excess noise

# **End-user - Preparation for online meetings (2)**

Test your Audio

Make sure you can hear well Consider an amplified phone

Prepare your Assistive Technology

Have AT "ready to go" Accommodation requests

#### **End-user - Preparation for online meetings (3)**

Enlist a support person

Have someone participate in the telehealth visit

#### During the appointment

Ask to have information repeated Ask for visit or meeting notes

# Wrap-Up

#### Where To Go From Here...

Accessibility is a learning process
Not everyone is the same
Don't make assumptions
Reach out to disability communities.
Keep the conversation going
